


APPRENTICESHIP OVERVIEW

Ambulance Support Workers respond to emergency (999), urgent and or/unscheduled care calls from the public and/or wider health and social care communities to provide care and clinical support to individuals of all ages within an agreed scope of practice and outside of a multidisciplinary hospital team, or provide scheduled non-urgent transport for people with specific health needs.




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ENTRY REQUIREMENTS AND QUALIFICATIONS

Qualifications

Apprentices will be required to complete two mandatory qualifications covering ambulance care and ambulance driving, with the combination being selected based on the specific role.

One accredited level 3 ambulance care qualification, from

- Diploma in Ambulance Emergency and Urgent Care Support
- Certificate in Ambulance Patient Care: Urgent Care Services
- Award in Ambulance Patient Care: Non-Urgent Care Services
- Certificate in Ambulance Patient Care: Non-Urgent Care Services

One accredited ambulance driving qualification, from

- level 3 Certificate in Emergency Response Ambulance Driving
- level 3 Award in Patient Care Services: Ambulance Driving

All apprentices must also pass the apprenticeship end-point assessment.




Entry requirements

Entry will be determined by employers and will include a fitness test and an organisational interview; Full GB driving licence.

Apprentices without level 2 English and maths will need to achieve this level prior to completing the end-point assessment.







Training Provider

All providers who want to deliver apprenticeship training must be on the Apprenticeship Provider and Assessment Register (APAR). Employers must choose a provider from the Register.

Providers must meet a clear set of criteria in order to be included on the Register. These include financial health, capacity/capability and quality criteria. If a provider does not meet these criteria they will not be included on the Register.


End point assessment

As part of their apprenticeship, apprentices will have to complete end-point assessment.

The end-point assessment organisation will assess the apprentice in line with the Ambulance Support Worker (Emergency, Urgent and Non-urgent) Assessment Plan. This ensures that all apprentices are assessed holistically to a consistent standard at the end of their apprenticeship.

Organisations offering end-point assessment will need to be registered on the Apprenticeship Provider and Assessment Register (APAR).

APPLYING AND PROGRESSION ROUTES


Candidates interested in applying for the Ambulance Support Worker apprenticeship should visit NHS Jobs, Find an Apprenticeship website and the Find apprenticeship training for your apprentice website. It may also be worth contacting training providers directly to make enquiries about the apprenticeships they offer.

Ambulance Support Worker apprentices will be over 18 and may earn more than the minimum apprenticeship wage. Pay is determined locally so whilst it may be higher, it cannot be lower than this amount. <u>O Click here</u> for more information on apprentice pay.

Ambulance Support Workers will usually be paid at <u>AfC (Agenda for Change) band 3 or 4</u>. With experience and further training, you could apply to train as a paramedic.

You could also progress to become a team leader or supervisor. You would be in charge of a team of emergency care assistants, responsible for allocating work and drawing up shift rotas.

The HASO website has tools designed to help employers embed their apprenticeships, see resources below:


